## Sandra Dunlap James WMU NC Recipient

Sandra and Leo spend several months each year serving as volunteers at the Hawaiian Baptist Conference Center. They have two married sons and six grandchildren.

### America's Preacher and World Missionary

ev. Billy Graham, a faithful and beloved North Carolinian, was called to his eternal home February 21st. He was known as America's preacher, but I think a more fitting title for him would be World Missionary. He preached the gospel on every continent, in more than 60 countries

in person, and reached 185 countries via satellite. He preached to 2.2 billion people. He preached in North Korea and behind the Communist Iron Curtain. He led a "Peace Conference" in Moscow, organized by the Communist party. He led a 17-day tour of China, in his lifelong effort to bring Christianity to the communist world. In 1995, an estimated 1

billion people, via satellite, heard the Gospel during his crusade in Puerto Rico. His message was interpreted in 116 languages.

We are reminded too how much he cared about the salvation of the people in America. Rev. Graham led a revival in Los Angeles that lasted

our shoulders when we ought to be flexing our muscles? What makes us apathetic in a day when there are loads to lift, a world to be won and captives to be set free? - Billy Graham

What makes us Christians shrug

eight weeks, due to the immense crowds. In New York, his first revival was 16 weeks and over 2.3 million people heard the Gospel. We know of his love for North Carolina and the crusades in Charlotte. Only now, as he entered into heaven, will he know the multitudes that are in heaven and will be in heaven because of his obedience to the Great Commission. I praise God that His favor was on his life, and He used him supernaturally through the power of the Holy Spirit.

We know he shared the Gospel to more people than anyone else in history, but who shared the Gospel with him? Let's look at this chain of progression:

- 1. Edward Kimball was a Sunday school teacher to teenage boys. He compared his class of hyper boys to herding cats and felt he wasn't having an impact. Dwight L Moody was in his class. He led Dwight to Christ in the stockroom of the shoe store where he worked, as he paid him a visit at his job.
- 2. Dwight Moody would go on to preach the Gospel on two continents, with thousands professing Christ. While preaching, another man's heart was touched, Wilbur Chapman.
- 3. Wilbur Chapman became an evangelist who preached to thousands also. One day, a professional ball player had a day off and attended one of Chapman's meetings. Billy Sunday gave his life to Christ that day.
- 4. Sunday quit baseball and began his own crusades. A man named Mordecai Ham was converted at Billy Sunday's crusades.
- 5. Mordecai Ham began to preach and came to Charlotte. One day, a young high school student, Billy Frank, as he was called by his family, reluctantly came to hear him preach and the rest they say is history.

This reminds me of dominoes in a line. Have you even put them vertical on the floor about a half-inch apart and spread them out? Then with the push of your hand on one, all of them fall down. Have you ever done it not quite right and it doesn't work and they stop falling down about halfway through? What would have happened if one of these men had not obeyed God? Possibly 2.2 billion may not have heard the Gospel.

Three things about Billy Graham's life particularly touch and inspire me:

- 1. *His integrity* His finances and conduct were above reproach. Before he entered a hotel room, he had his staff check it out to make sure no women were in there. In 99 years, there was never a scandal over his lack of integrity. God blessed this.
- 2. His belief that a man is not defined by the color of his skin He was a leader during America's Civil Rights movement and worked with Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. This took great courage in a violent time in our nation's history. When he was asked to preach in Arkansas, he was told he would need to have two stadiums – one for the blacks, and one for the whites. Rev. Graham refused to go to Arkansas until the two races could come together. The government finally granted his wish. In South Africa, he was asked to lead a crusade and was told the same thing, except he would need to preach in 3 stadiums, where the 3 races would be separated. He told them he would not come until all races could worship together. It took 20 years for the government to agree to this, but he waited and went 20 years later to one of the first integrated events ever in apartheid South Africa.
- 3. His message and methods While his message that Jesus is the only way to salvation never changed, he was willing to use creative methods to reach different age groups. While always having George Beverly Shea and others sing, in time he began to include dc Talk with lead singer Toby Mac, Amy Grant, Larnelle Harris and Ethyl Waters. In his final movie, My Hope with Billy Graham, he featured the Christian rapper, Lecrae. While his message didn't change, he was always aware that we have the next generation to reach and if we keep our methods the same, they will not hear the Gospel in music and a style that will reach them.

He was honored in this life by being laid in honor in the US Capital in Washington D.C. He is the first private citizen since Rosa Parks to ever lie in honor in the US Capital. How fitting for these honors to be bestowed on him and Rosa Parks, since they both fought for equality for all. While it is wonderful to be honored in this life, all Billy Graham wanted and all we should want is to please the Lord Jesus, with whom we will spend eternity if we have placed our faith in Him. What would God have you and me learn from this great hero? Recommit yourself at the start of this summer to be the hands and feet of Jesus in your part of the world; and as you travel this summer, share Christ wherever you go.

Offering Emphasis during the first quarter of 2018. Many of you prayed and gave and invited us into your churches to share about the missions and ministries of WMU NC. In fact, during the months of February and March, more than 25 representatives spoke in over 60 churches across our state. We appreciate pastors, WMU directors, age-level leaders, musicians, and others who helped prepare for these opportunities. I personally experienced a GA Recognition Service, a beautiful Festival of Tables, an inspiring Sunday School lesson, and a congregation of 73 people give a first-time Heck-Jones Offering of \$590.

The theme of this year's emphasis, **Fan the Flame**, focused on Paul's words to Timothy:

"I am reminded of your sincere faith, which first lived in your grandmother Lois and in your mother Eunice and, I am persuaded, now lives in you also. For this reason I remind you to fan into flame the gift of God, which is in you through the laying on of my hands."

— 2 Timothy 1:5-6 NIV

We in WMU NC realize that some of our best organizational leaders had no foundation in WMU basics as children and young women, having come from other denominations or from churches with no age-level organizations. Through mentoring and training, and pursuing God's call on their lives, they have touched many people. However, I encountered a beautiful Lois-Eunice-Timothy story I'd like to share with you.

Consider Susan, Allison, Julie. Grandmother, mother, daughter. Susan's parents were strong missions people. In fact, she has a picture of her dad's mother going to mission meeting in 1902. Her mother was a strong WMUer and her father a staunch supporter of the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering and the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering. Grandmother Susan, a retired kindergarten teacher, had grown up in GAs; and when their

church experienced a lull in the GA program, she decided to lead GAs so Julie would have the experiences she had had as a child. Today, Julie is an Acteen of whom it is said, "Whatever is going on in missions through our church, she is there." Julie leads in making crafts for children at Wake Medical Center. At an annual street fair, she sells crafts to support her ministries. The beautiful bracelet shown in the picture is part of Julie's "Jesus and the Children" ministry. A large bead represents God, then multicolored beads represent the children of God — all different, all precious in His sight. Julie carries bracelets in her purse and is always on the lookout for someone who needs a gift.

To Julie, Paul would say: "I am reminded of your sincere faith, which first lived in your grandmother Susan and in your mother Allison and, I am persuaded, now lives in you also. For this reason I remind

you to **fan into flame** the gift of God . . ."

# Missions Extravaganza & 127th Annual Meeting



Missions
Extravaganza 2018
was hosted by
Ardmore Baptist
Church, WinstonSalem, NC. On April
27 and 28 close to
500 women (and

yes, some men) gathered together for the 127<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting and missions conference. Friday evening opened with the flags of the nations processional and with the congregation singing "Song of the Nations." The theme for this year was "Redeemed, Restored, Released." Each session focused on one of these themes through song, testimonies and scripture. Worship was led by Ardmore's Dr. Jim

Davidson, accompanied each session by various musicians and singers from the church including, Harmonia with Frank Voltz, Gustavo Antoniacomi accompanied by Johnathan Williams and Keith McHone.

Taylor and Susan Field of *Graffiti Ministries* in New York were the keynote speakers for the conference. Taylor and Susan brought perspective and an "upside down" view of our actions, worship, and obedience to God. Taylor shared that their ministry has condensed thousands of pages of "how-to" down to 13 words. He spoke each session unpacking these. He began with the 4 four most important words of their ministry: *Meet the need first*. In order to do this, we are to:

*Serve the Unserved*, Luke 14:12. God loves them just as much as he loves me. Who is the one who can't pay me back...that is the person I should be looking to serve. Remember, everyone has a gift, something to offer. One woman at *Graffiti* shared, "Partial commitment brings stress and strife. Total commitment brings joy and life"

See the Unseen, 2 Corinithians 4:18. Instead of looking at one's behavior, try to see beyond, where will they are going, where they will be in 5-10 years. "Stop leading — if there is a God, if He is telling us what to do we don't need 15 more techniques of leadership, we need to learn to listen. Isaiah 30 says, 'this is the way, walk in it' You won't have enough time to do what you want to do or what others want you to do BUT you will have enough time to do what God wants you to do. You can't always see the picture when you are inside the frame. Step outside of the normal frame and rest, to see God's invisible love" Vince Lombardi once said, "Exhaustion makes cowards of us all."

when actually this verse says "For where two or three gather in my name..." There are three tiers of ministry.

- **1. Bless the Many** (where we serve food to a large group, pack buddy backpacks, host a community yard sale)
- **2. Invest in the Few** (think of when Jesus invested in Peter and John this is the time when we get discouraged, the devil wants to take your courage. The most valuable essential you possess as a believer is the Holy Spirit, our encourager, paraclete, and Satan's accuser.
- **3. Things Can Get Out of Hand** (when the ones you have invested in want to get involved. The kingdom of God is described as a mustard seed. Funny fact —

gardeners didn't want to plant mustard seeds in their gardens because it was invasive and would take over.

Our mission projects supported Operation Bandanas and Ronald McDonald House of Winston-Salem.

"What a wonderful experience to share the mission of Operation Bandanas, a ministry of spiritual encouragement for our armed force, with so many mission-minded women coming together from across our State! God's power has been unleashed in Saintard, Haiti. The Eastern Baptist Association has its handprints and footprints throughout Saintard. Haiti has a population of 12 million with the landmass of 10,714 square miles. The state of North Carolina has a population of 10 million with a landmass of 53,819 square miles. As you can see the country of Haiti will fit inside the state of North Carolina and the population of Haiti continues to grow. With the lack of resources and education they continue being one of the poorest countries. Some even comment that there is no hope for Haiti. Let me clear the air by saying with Jesus Christ, there is always hope. When asked, "How will Haiti ever change?" the answer always given was, "Educate the Children." Four years ago, we prayed, trusted and believed and began our work of building a church and school in an effort to change Haiti, one child at a time. When we arrived in Haiti, January 2018, for our annual mission trip we were totally amazed at what all we saw. God's POWER had been Unleashed. Right before our eyes was the church, school, banana orchard, the wall to secure the property that we had worked so hard to make happen, children in classrooms singing to us in English. All we had prayed and worked for was before us, but God wasn't finished. The truly amazing thing was God had provided something we never had in our original plans. There was a well that was just waiting for water to start flowing and flowing it did at eight gallons a minute; pure, clean drinking water. You see several months prior to our trip God allowed unexpected donations to be given for a well and solar panels. Wow, our God is a God of true blessings and provisions. God gave us a 180 ft deep well with 100 ft of pure, clear flowing water right underneath the church and school, and solar panels on top of the school that are now providing electricity. After many years of prayer, work, doubt- and yes, at times doubt crept in, My God said, "I told you to trust ME my child." Through the WMU Region 3 Rally that was held this past August we were able to take flip flops for our Haitian brothers and sisters, if you could have seen the smiles on their faces. God also touched the hearts of those attending the Hearts for Haiti breakout session. Some child sponsorships have finally started coming in. I am reminded when God gives any of us a vision we should be prayerful and ask for His direction, be obedient, and believe in THE POWER OF AN ALMIGHTY GOD.

### Defining Moments... Redeemed, Restored, and Released.

hether you were able to attend
Missions Extravaganza this year or
not, I want to use part of the theme
from that weekend to talk about the key
words used in each general session.

#### Redeemed...Restored...Released

**Redeemed** — When you hear that word what comes to mind? Immediately an old hymn comes to my mind...Redeemed How I Love to Proclaim It...Redeemed by the blood of the Lamb. There's also a more contemporary song by Big Daddy Weave called Redeemed and it says:

Seems like all I can see was the struggle, Haunted by ghosts that lived in my past, Bound up in shackles of all my failures, Wondering how long is this gonna last. Then You look at this prisoner and say to me "son, stop fighting a fight that's already been won." I am redeemed. You set me free. So I'll shake off these heavy chains and wipe away every stain – now I'm not who I used to be I am redeemed. I'm redeemed.

One of the definitions I found for redeem reads "to save (someone) from sin, error, or evil." As Christians we know we have been redeemed (saved from sin) by our Lord and Savior. We should be "on mission" every day to help someone else know how they can be redeemed. That is our mandate. That is our Great Commission!

**Restored** — There is a praise song and a scripture verse that both say.... "Restore unto me the joy of thy salvation." I found a definition for restore that says "to bring back to a state of health, soundness, or vigor." I like that definition. Jesus Christ on the cross restores us to being the best we can be. He wants us to have joy!

All that stuff we've done to ourselves to "beat ourselves up" is gone — we are restored to His image. Beautiful in His eyes! There are moments in my life when I cry out for God to restore me — to renew a right spirit within me. I am sure we can all think of someone who has low self-esteem or is constantly critical of themselves. Maybe you know someone who has been incarcerated or a victim of human trafficking or a CWJC participant. They need to hear from YOU the good news of Jesus Christ — that He will "restore" them and heal them from the inside out.

Released — I love this definition of released..."set free." I think about a bird in a cage and when that cage door is open the bird might hesitate but not for long — the bird soars and wants to fly high and far. Think about our life in Christ...isn't that what He wants from us — to be set free — to not let anything weigh us down or distract us from living for Him. Immediately the song that comes to my mind by Chris Tomlin says, "My chains are gone, I've been set free. My God my Savior has ransomed me. And like a flood His mercy rains, Unending love, Amazing grace." I can't help but smile and praise God whenever I hear that song. I think about the inmates I've ministered to at the annual women's prison retreat. I think about the PTSD victim who has been healed from his or her emotional wounds. I see them worshipping and praising God with arms outstretched because they have found freedom in Christ and their chains are gone.

As people that love Jesus and want to serve Him in missions through WMU NC let's show others throughout the summer how they can be *redeemed*, *restored*, *and released* to be all that God wants them to be. Summer provides the perfect opportunity to be aware of people all around us. More people are outside because of the nice weather. Notice those in your neighborhood – at the pool – at ballgames – wherever you go each day be the hands, feet and voice of Jesus. Make your summer a series of





### Ten Compelling Reasons Why Children's Missions Education Is Important

**Teaches children that life isn't all about them.** Children learn to be Godcentered instead of self-centered.

**Demonstrates to children how God is at work in the world through stories from the mission field.** God is at work all around us, but sometimes it takes being able to step back and see the big picture to see that God is at work.

**Cultivates an atmosphere where children are accepted — always inclusive, never exclusive.** Missions education teaches children to go and minister to all people. This includes ministering to children at school by showing them the love of Christ.

Provides a place where children participate in fun, age-appropriate learning activities. Curriculum is written appropriately for the mental, social, physical, and spiritual development of children.

**Instills godly characteristics in children**. The curriculum reinforces the Biblical mandate to be a light in the darkness through word and deed.

**Offers outreach to non-churched families.** Non-churched parents are more likely to send their children to church if they perceive the church is teaching them to not only "be good" but "do good." Also, non-churched families hear about children doing ministry projects in the community.

**Encourages children to learn and apply the Bible to their lives.** This is the only organization at church where children actively go and demonstrate their faith through missions projects and witnessing.

**Teachers serve as role models and mentors/coaches for children.** Missions education is more hands-on and allows leading by example. Children see adults living out the Great Commission in the classroom and on the mission field.

Offers opportunities where parents can serve. Here are a few examples of how parents can serve: teach, lead activities, bring snacks, donate supplies, plan mission projects, chaperone mission projects, and participate in outreach to children.

**Provides outreach to the community and the church.** Through mission projects, God's love is shared and lives are changed.

**Outcome:** Children learn what God desires of them and are encouraged to live out the Great Commission.

One of the great things that we can teach and model for our kids is volunteering. This is something entire families can do together as they "put feet to their faith." #### HOST a BOOK Drive

Collect gently used books, CDs and DVDs and donate them to schools, libraries and homeless shelters.

#### VOLUNTEER AT THE SCHOOL FALL FESTIVAL

Running a game booth, ticket stand, or even cleaning up with your family.

#### **Be a Neighbor**

Challenge each child to help three neighbors with small things around their house this week. Older kids can help neighbors by weeding, mowing, painting, housesitting, or pet-sitting. Preschoolers enjoy leaving flowers or handmade cards on doorsteps.

#### HOST a TOY Drive

Everybody does it at Christmas but kids need toys yearround. So, chose a time during the middle of the year and encourage everyone to drop off toys to be donated.

#### **VISIT A NURSING HOME**

The initial visit for this one takes the longest. First meet with the Activities Director for a few minutes, filled out any needed paperwork and st a date for your group to come by to visit. Some suggested activities sing, bring flowers, or just visit with a resident.

#### volunteer to read

Libraries and schools are always looking for volunteer readers. Offer to staff your public library's reading hour with families from your church, or encourage kids to help younger readers at their schools.

#### **HOST A FAMILY WORKDAY**

Announce a workday for families at your church. Make a list of chores such as vacuuming, painting, gardening, or spring cleaning. Provide coffee, juice, and doughnuts.

#### visit an animal shelter

Set a day to collect materials to donate to the shelter.

Many shelters need stuff we all have around the house like old towels, newspaper, or a roll of paper towels we can donate easily. Then set a day to visit, we load the kids and supplies in the car and visit the animal shelter.

#### say "Thanks" To First responders

Prepare baked goods and treats and deliver them to the local Police and Fire Stations.

Participate in cleaning up your local neighborhood, park or community center.

n addition to my position with WMU NC, I have the privilege of being an Acteens leader in my

local church. After one of our recent meetings, I left with my heart heavy and my soul feeling burdened. I rarely leave feeling anything but joy and contentment. I find our meetings are usually filled with laughter, bonding, and a mutual excitement for Jesus. But this night was different.

My original lesson for the evening centered on sharing faith in real, tangible ways. We talked about how important loving others is, how growing up and walking in faith is hard. The girls had great, albeit it difficult, questions for me surrounding these things. I could tell their hearts were burdened with some of the issues they are dealing with at their age and my own heart grew a little weary.

We wrapped up our time that evening, said our goodbyes and turned off the classroom light. I watched them walk down the hallway and outside where they waited on their rides to pick them up and I thought...this is the reason.

This is the reason we have to *keep going* as leaders. The upcoming generations need us to press on. To teach. To love. To help them grow.

I think the reason my heart was so heavily burdened that evening was because it was a strong reminder that there is much work to be done for the next generation. Perhaps you see this too within your own church and group. Maybe you see the need within your mission group, Bible study or prayer group. There are people that need us to press on and keep going as leaders.

People need strong, biblical leaders to **stand up for them**. To pray fervently over them. To speak the truth in love to them based on the foundation of God's holy word. # All Things New

"Behold, I will do a new thing; now it shall bring forth; shall ye not know it? I will even make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." Isaiah 43:19

n February 3 our NC Baptist Nursing Fellowship celebrated its 35<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting and we learned of "All Things New."

From the Bible we know that God has

promised many "new" things to us: He gave us a new commandment (John 13:34), new covenant (Jeremiah 31:31), new creature (2 Corinthians 5:17), new heaven and new earth (Isaiah 65:17), new spirit within people (Ezekiel 11:19), new name (Isaiah 62:2), and a new song (Isaiah 42:10).

We know that all the promises are fulfilled in Jesus Christ (2 Corinthians 1:20). Our hope is that Christ will come back for us one day and make *all things new* (Revelation 21:5).

Scripture has many stories that show us how God makes things new. So, how does He make things new for us today?

- 1) When we become followers of Christ, He promises a "new name." Names and their meanings are very significant in the Bible. Eve was "the mother of all the living," Isaac was "laughter," and Samuel was "asked of God." When God changes the names of people in the Bible, it marks the start of a new relationship or a new phase in relationship with him: Abram to Abraham (Genesis 17:5), Simon to Peter, Saul to Paul (Matthew 4:18, Acts 13:9). We may not receive new names today, but we receive new identities as Christ-followers.
- 2) God "restores" lost relationships, lost years, disabilities: Jesus restores sight to the blind, the ability to walk to the crippled, hearing to the deaf, and new clean skin to the diseased (Mark 8:22-26, Matthew 9:2-8, Mark 7:31-37, Luke 5:12-25). He restores our soul: through His Word to guide us, encourage us and nourish us spiritually, through prayer, fellowship and worship with other believers. In Joel 2:18-26 we learn that God restored lost years and the result was both physical and spiritual. We restore our relationship with Christ (1 John 1:9). The first step in repairing relationships is to know that we are forgiven and that we are to forgive others (Ephesians 4:32).
- 3) God "resurrects" as He has power over death. He raised Jesus from the grave. His power in us, as believers, gives life to our dead souls (Romans 8:11). We have the power of His resurrection to overcome any life situation. We are restored from our failures with new life and new grace.

Our NCBNF program relating to missions included Renee Crane, former IMB missionary, and member Mindy Flowe, RN. Ann Marie Carter reported on our mission trip to Guatemala, and Claudia Hayes, MSN talked about her trip to China. Amy Boone, WMU NC Executive Director was first on Saturday's agenda. Genevra Kelly from Wake Forest presented "Regenerative Medicine: Science Fiction Becoming Science Fact." There was a time of recognition of BNF officers, as we thank those who have served and installed with a Blessing of the Hands those coming in.

The tree (see below image and explanation) was our NCBNF symbol of "all things new" during our prayer walk and spiritual renewal time.

**Roots** = represent the **Bible** as we are faith-based in His Word; with God everything is possible.

**Trunk = NCBNF** is a fellowship of Christian Nurses, seeking to model and encourage others to model Christian professional care giving. We are gathered from many backgrounds and share our expertise. The tree rings represent our long years of history. From the center (organized in 1983), our rings continue to steadily wind and circle outward,

with some unevenness and spots as we have learned and grown and expanded through the years. We remain as a strong core because we work together for God's purpose and in His service.

**Branches = Chapters and Members.** To carry out our NCBNF purposes, which are: To provide Christian professional fellowship, to promote continuing professional education and growth for membership and nurse missionaries, to encourage nursing service that evolves from a personal commitment to Jesus Christ.

**Leaves =** Our **good works and service to God.** Our leaves represent what we have accomplished and also what we plan to do in the future in His service. The colorful leaves will shed in the fall - but with the spring many leaves will be added, as the tree will be nourished throughout the winter, and sprout with new growth. And, there are many opportunities to serve God. We seek God's guidance and listen to Him to plan future missions and to accomplish His will.

Our NCBNF "Tree" will continue to survive and flourish because our roots are firmly planted, we receive nourishment, together we form a strong core, we have direction and purpose, and we will spring forth with many beautiful leaves.

It is interesting to note that the Bible begins in Genesis with the Tree of Life, and ends in Revelation with the Tree of Life. People have sought the knowledge of the Tree of Life throughout history and we continue to seek it all the years of our lives – from the beginning to the end when we will be with God.

"By the river on its bank, on one side and on the other, will grow all kinds of trees for food. Their leaves will not wither and their fruit will not fail. They will bear every month because their water flows from the sanctuary, and their fruit will be for food and their leaves for healing." Ezekiel 47:12


#### MARGARET'S PICKS

Esther: It's Tough Being a Woman By Beth Moore




This Bible study gives an in-depth and very personal examination of Esther's story. Esther is an amazing narrative complete with tragedy and triumph. You'll

study is "the desire of a holy God to dwell among mortals." Much of the study was the Old Testament tabernacle and then God's desire for my heart to be





### Christian Women's Job Corps®

#### **Level | National Certification Training**

On February 21, seven women arrived in Hendersonville, NC to begin a three and one-half day National Training Certification with Christian Women's Job Corps. These women were from North and South Carolina. Two had already begun serving as site coordinators in existing sites and had each brought someone with them to work alongside them in the ministry. Two were investigating what it might look like to start a new site in their own community, one of these women is a graduate of CWJC and one was intentionally attending to be of support to the site where we were holding the training.

Time was spent learning about the foundations of CWJC which include a Strength-Based Philosophy and a Theology of Poverty (to understand that poverty can be defined as a broken relationship with God, others, self and resources). Time was also focused on differentiating between Deficit-Based and Strength-Based responses to people. Strength Based sees the abilities and potential in individuals and works with the individual to nurture these attributes. This philosophy also provides a means to offer development of an individual rather than relief or restoration, getting the person back to where they were before a crisis. These foundations make up the rationale for the key elements of CWJC and provide the structure around which this ministry is designed.

After completing the training and pre-requisite reading, these women were certified to register their intent to begin or work in a CWJC site.

Overheard at this training were statements such as:

"Developing a whole person—how could anyone think that could be done in 6 weeks?"

"I wish I had had this training before I started work with another organization... I could really have made a difference there."

"I can look back at my life and see exactly where God was preparing me to lead this in my community. I'm amazed at where I'm being led."

"How could we have developed such strong friendships in just a few days ... only God can do that."

Surely God was working in and on the lives of the women at this training. Now, we anxiously and expectantly watch and pray for what is to come.









In April, one of these participants registered her intent to begin a new site in NC! Please pray as she and those partnering with her begin to lay the foundations to work with women in their area.


